The Library needs to change because your community profile is changing

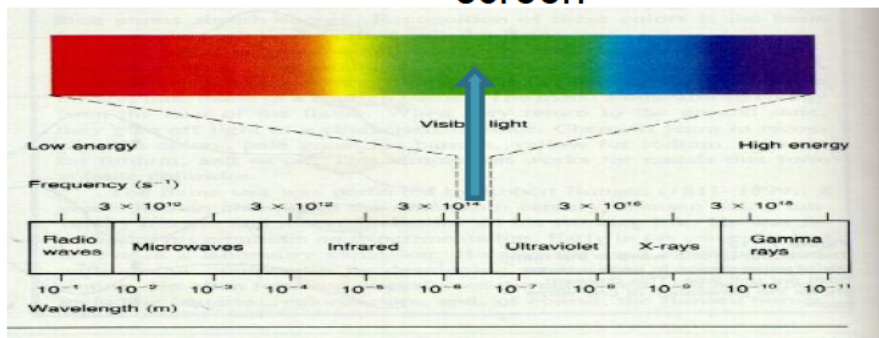


Changing Technologies

There is now increased competition:

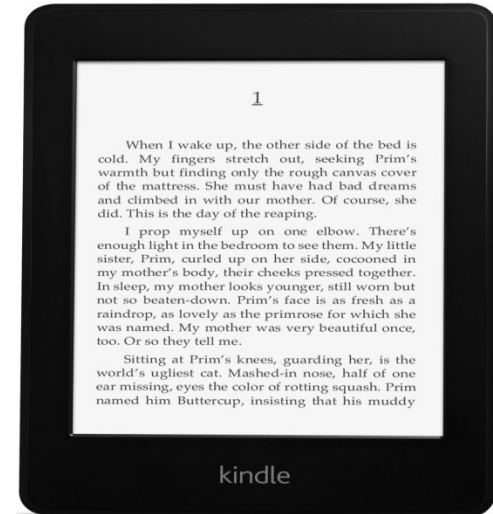
from other information providers

Changing Service Demands

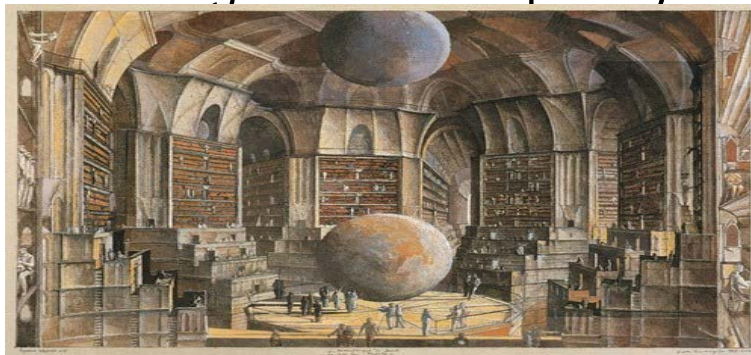

increasing search complexity

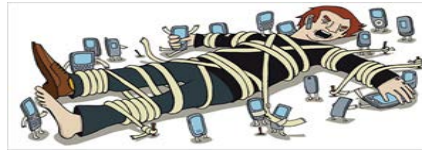
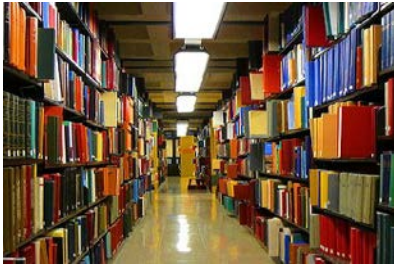

Potential for experiential distortion and overload:

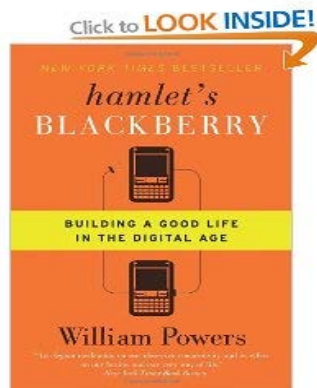
Disorientation by information overload
generalities overwhelmed by specifics
saturation by stimulation
focus on narrow resource types
polarization of formats and perceptions
loss of balanced perspective

place & environment

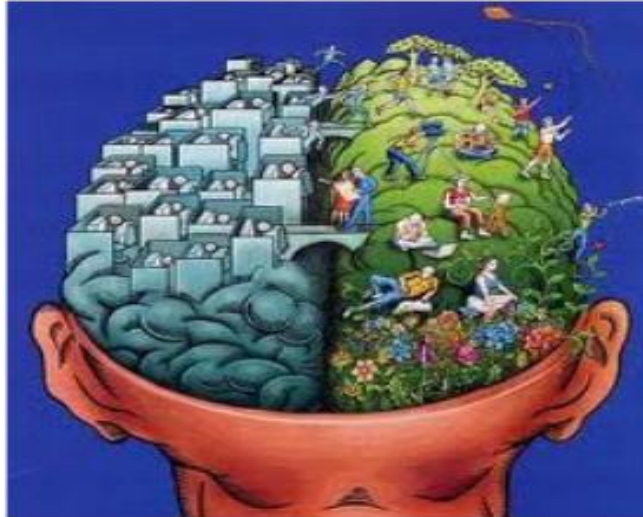

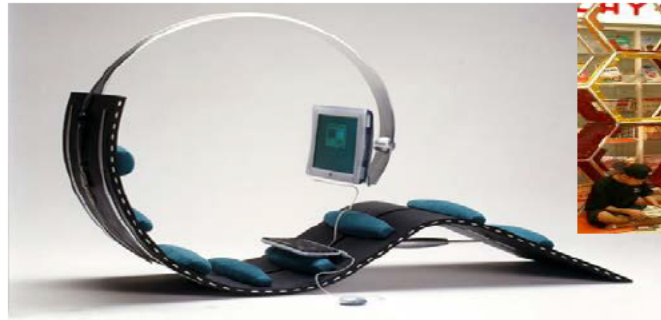

- Natural light



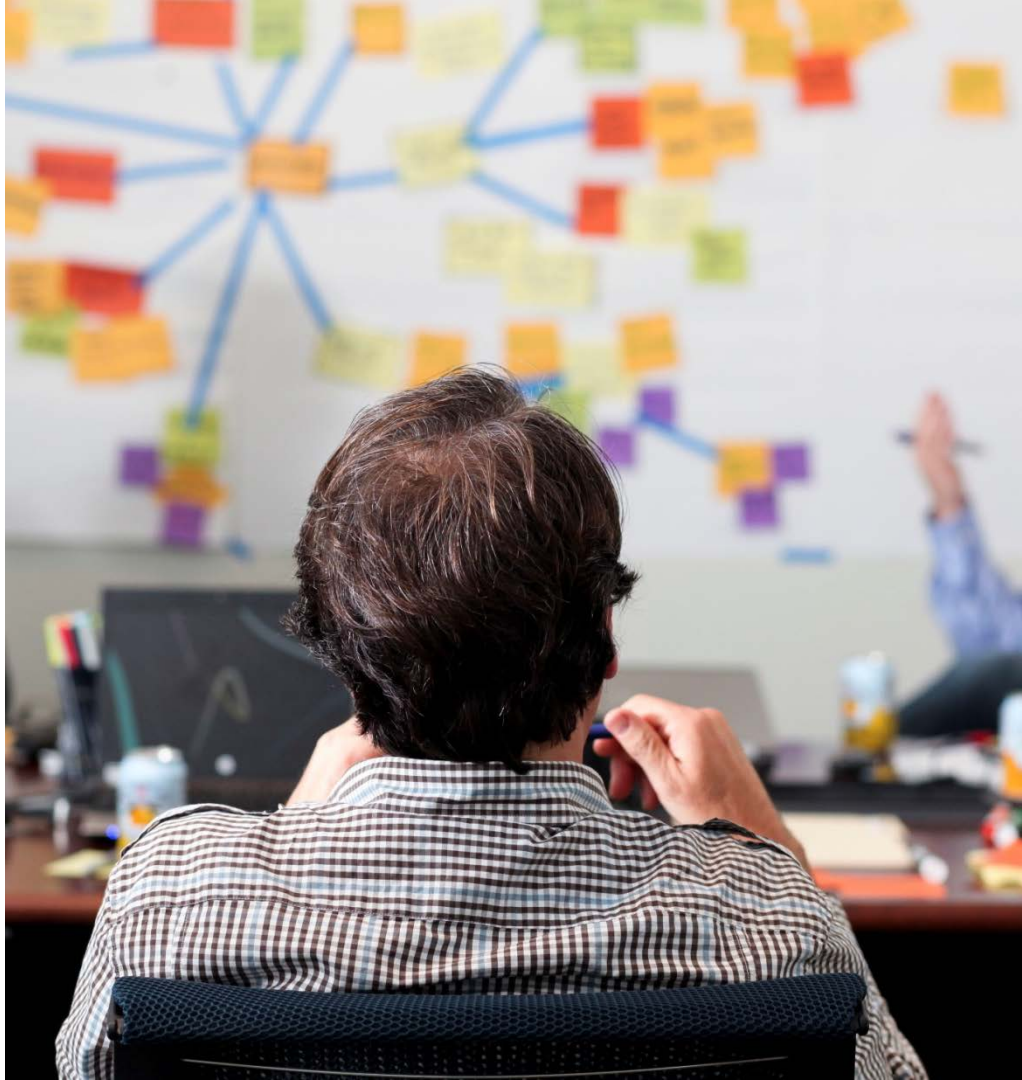
Mechanical & Electrical

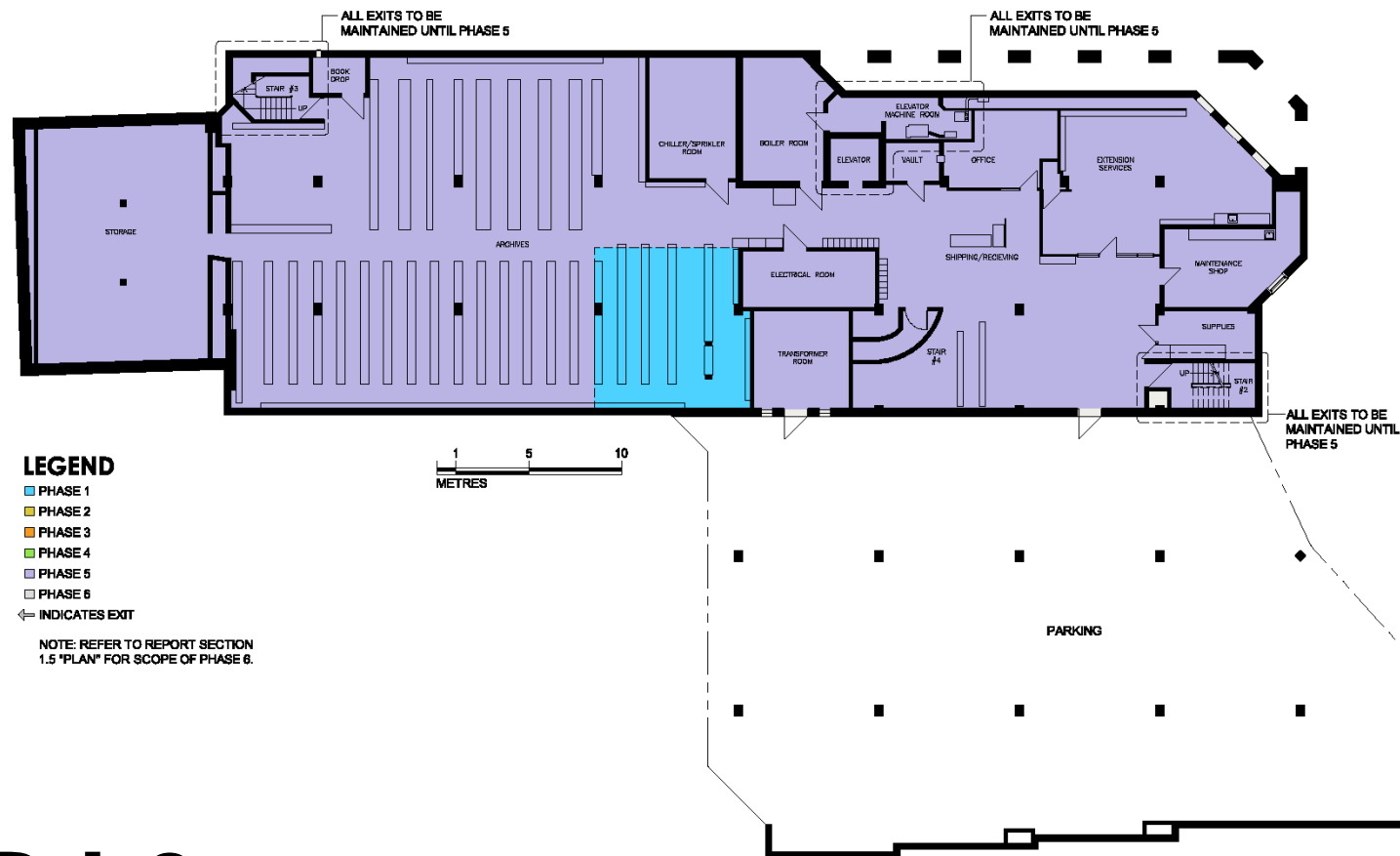
- Provide high level of occupant comfort

- Be flexible enough to be functional during a phased construction



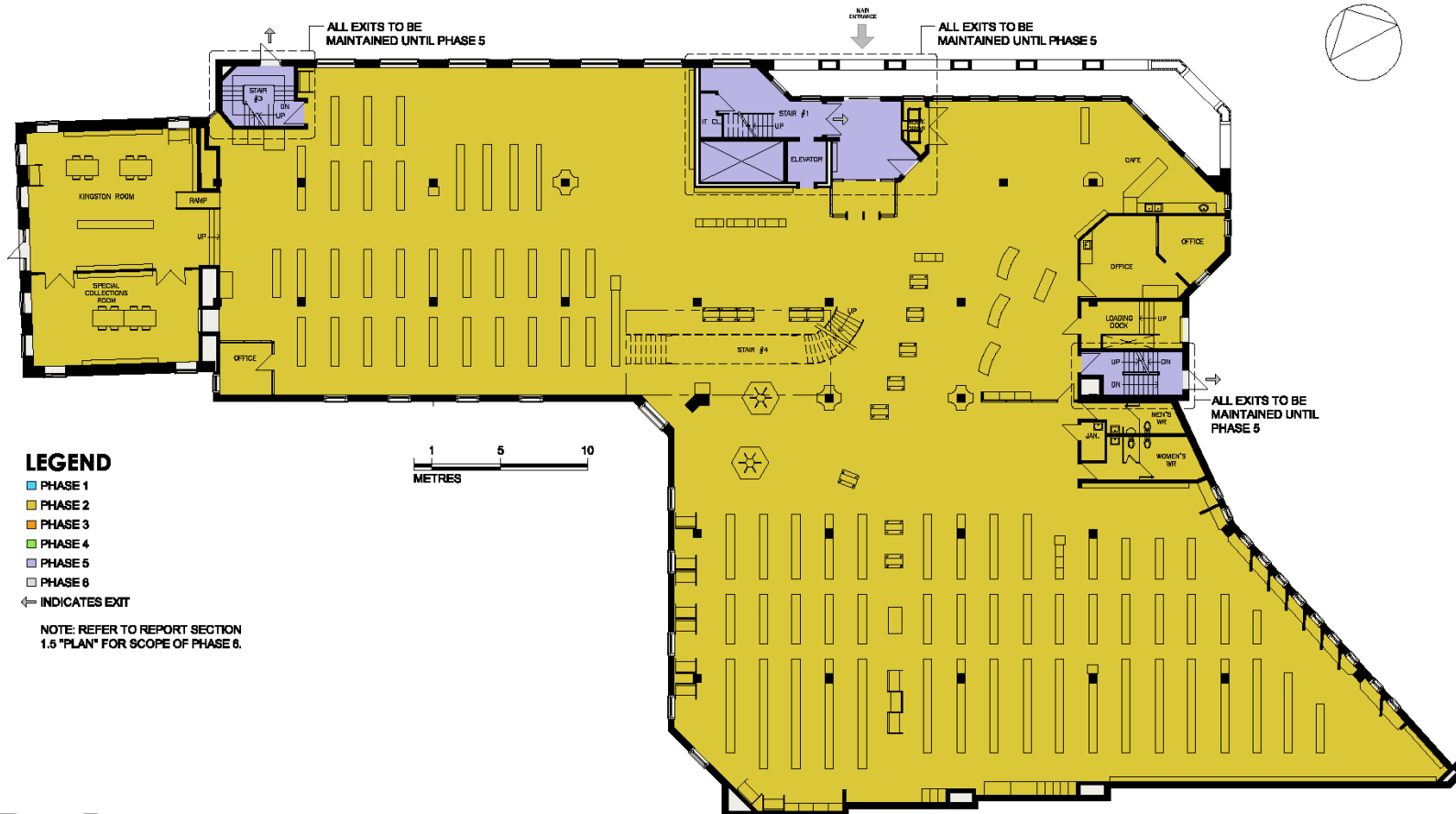
Project Phasing

- Phase 1 – New Mechanical/Electrical Room
- Phase 2 – Renovation Level 1
- Phase 3 – Renovation Level 2
- Phase 4 – Renovation Level 3
- Phase 5 – Decommissioning/Entrance Renovations/Loading Dock
- Phase 6 – Exterior Envelope Repairs/Minor Roof Repairs/Structural Repairs



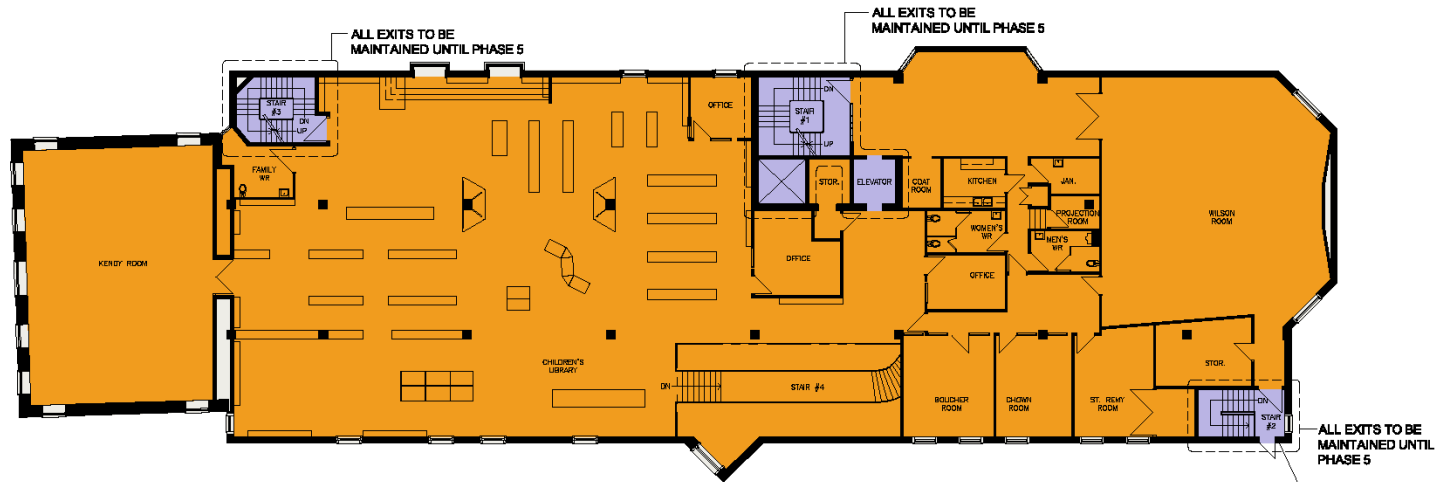

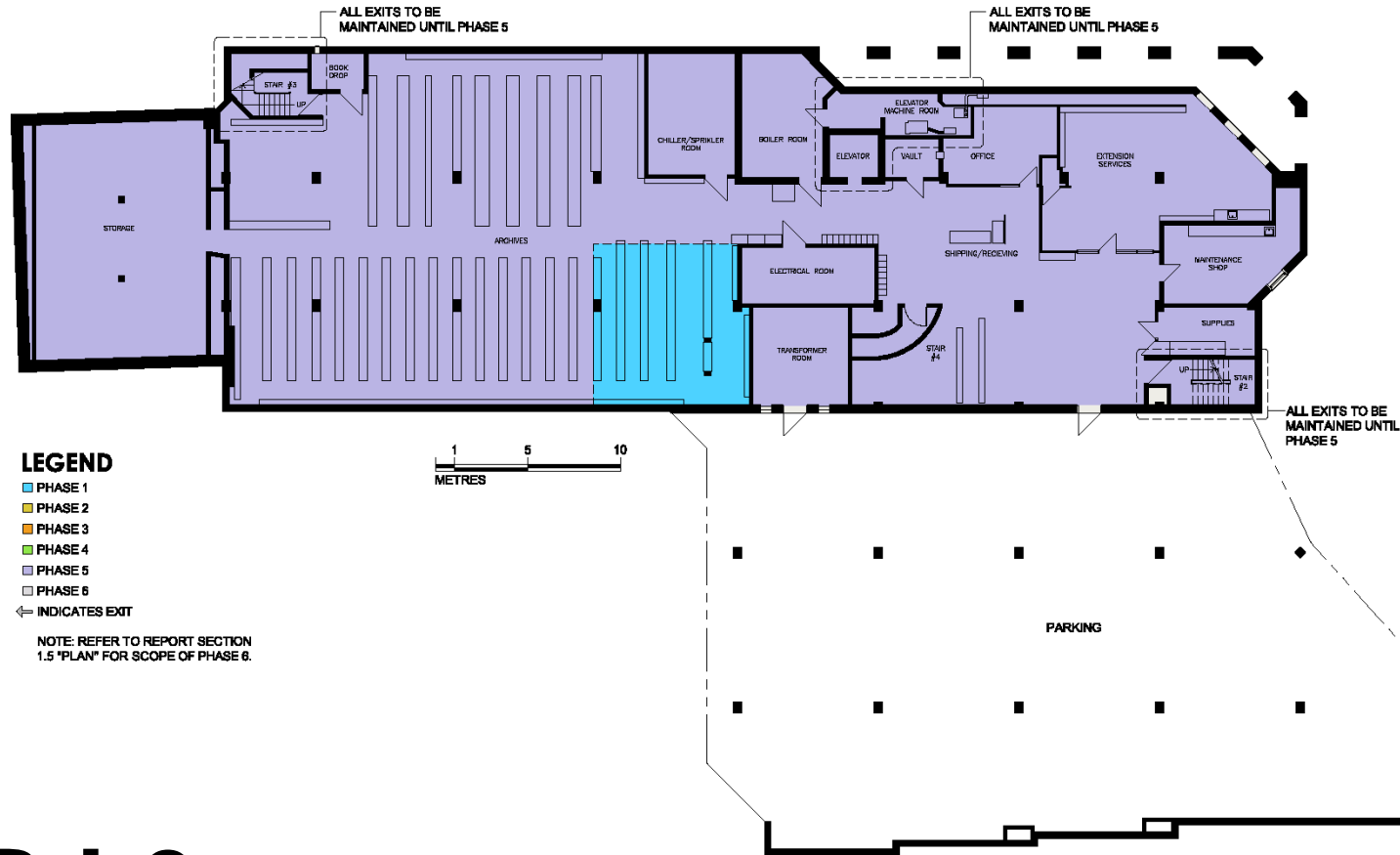

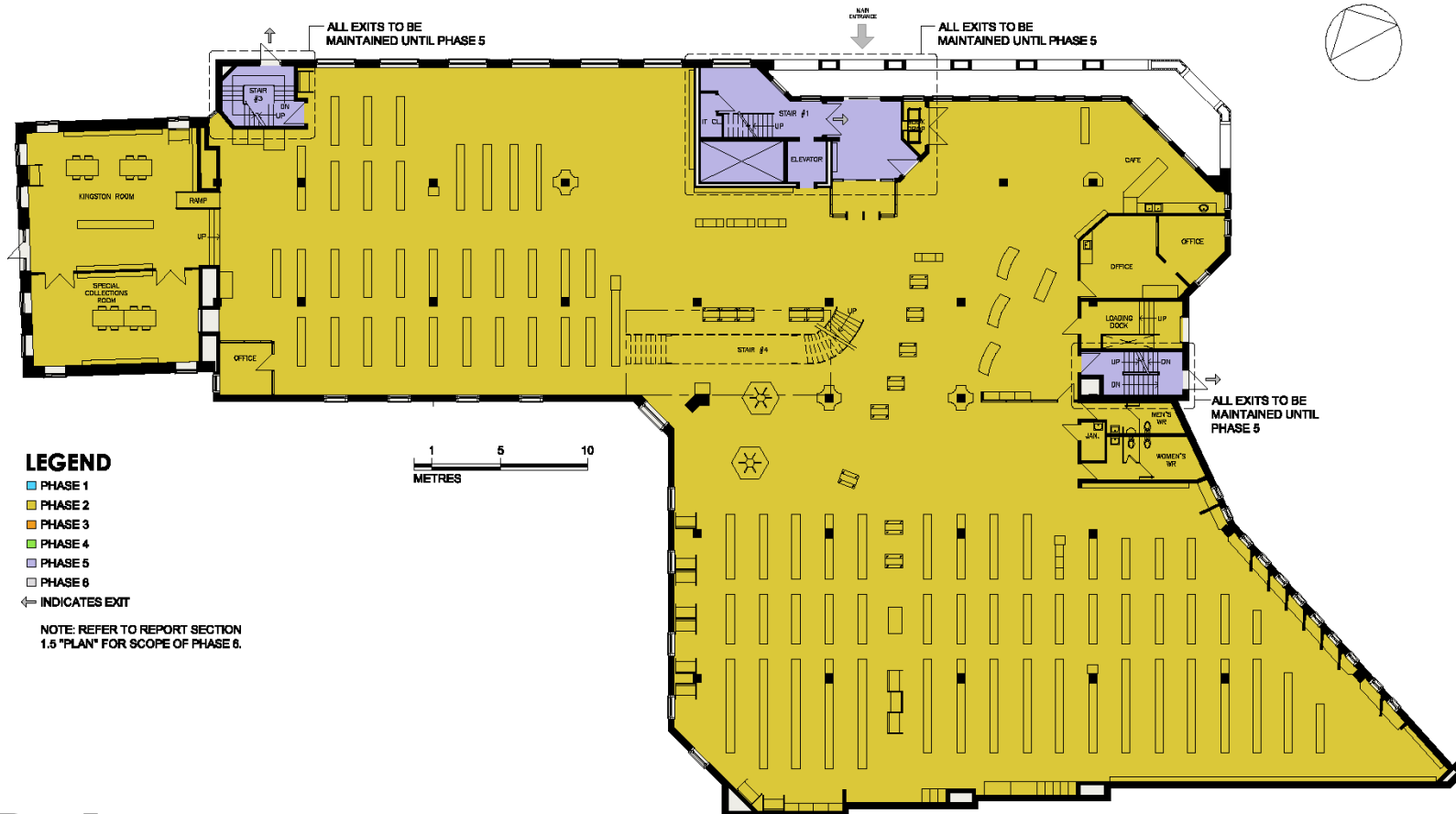
