The Library needs to change because your community profile is changing






The Library needs to change because access to information is changing:

The spectrum of information always evolves:

screen







There is an ever-increasing dependence on information:

(and equal access to information)








Information has new sources:

client-centric cross-disciplinary universal








Exposure to Information Can Stimulate

Patrons have multi-faceted objectives:


social cultural financial educational recreational artistic

The immense size of modern databases gives us a feeling of meaninglessness. Information in such quantities reminds us of Borges' library extending infinitely in all directions. Potential for experiential distortion and overload:



Disorientation by information overload generalities overwhelmed by specifics saturation by stimulation focus on narrow resource types polarization of formats and perceptions loss of balanced perspective










Perspectives can be diminished:



Mechanical & Electrical

- Provide high level of occupant comfort
- Controlled temperature/humidity
- Meet sustainability goals & carbon footprint
- Provide flexible design
- Be flexible enough to be functional during a phased construction

- Phase 6 Exterior Envelope Repairs/Minor Roof Repairs/Structural Repairs
